Introduction

Under April 2017 legislation, UK employers with a workforce of more than 250 are required to publish their Gender Pay Gap.

What is the Gender Pay Gap?

The Gender Pay Gap looks at the overall pay of men and women, without considering their roles or seniority. This means that the Gender Pay Gap does not provide any insight into Equal Pay, which is the requirement to pay men and women equally for work of equal value.

Logobrand review this continually to ensure that all our employees are paid fairly for the work they do.

We support flexible working contracts and part-time roles, which opens up the opportunity to work for all . We enable our staff to plan their work around their personal commitments, rather than the other way round which can be a barrier for those with other responsibilities, such as children or elderly relatives, in fulfilling some of their career objectives.

The level of freedom that we can offer our workforce is limited in a professional sales environment. This means that we can attract some great talent – those who are unable to commit to full-time roles but have the desire and drive to really make a difference for our clients.

Legislative requirements:

All UK companies with a workforce of 250 or more are required to publish specific gender pay information:

- Mean and median gender pay gap
- Mean and median gender bonus gap
- Proportion of males and females receiving a bonus
- Proportion of males and females by quartile pay band

Figures for each legal entity with at least 250 employees must be calculated and reported separately.

The yearly mean and median gender pay gap is based on hourly rates of pay on the previous 5th April.

The mean and median gender bonus gap considers bonus pay received in the 12 months leading up to the previous 5th April.

Pay quartiles look at the proportion of men and women in four pay bands when we divide our workforce into four equal parts.

What is our Gender Pay Gap at Logobrand?

The mean gender pay gap is the difference in average hourly rates of pay that male and female employees receive. This gives an overall indication of the gender pay gap by taking all hourly rates of pay and dividing by the total number of people in scope.

The median gender pay gap shows the difference in the midpoints of the ranges of hourly rates of pay for men and women by ordering individual rates of pay from lowest to highest and comparing the middle value.

The UK median Gender Pay Gap for full-time and part-time workers is 13.1% for the year 2023/24. This means that on average, hourly pay for women was 13.1% lower than for men. At **Logobrand Field Marketing our median Gender Pay Gap for 2024/25 is 1.5%.**

At Logobrand, our mean gender pay gap for hourly pay is 7.4%. The median gender pay gap for hourly pay is 1.5%.

Mean and median gender bonus gap

The mean gender bonus gap is the difference in average bonus pay that male and female employees receive. The median gender bonus gap shows the difference in the midpoints of the ranges of bonus pay received by men and women.

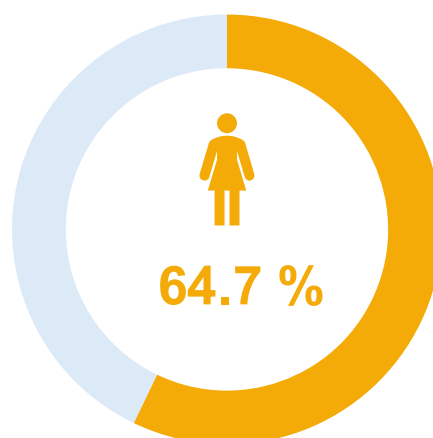
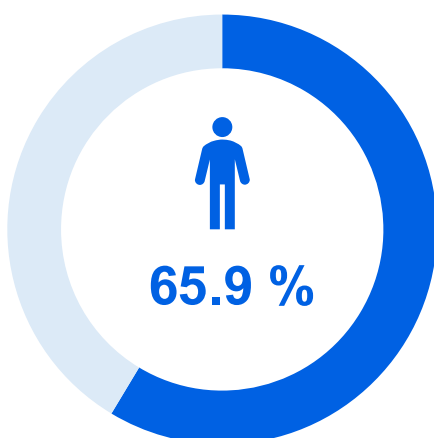
Bonuses paid tend to be linked to area of work and the number of hours worked are not gender relevant.

On average men work more hours than the women which is reflected in the median bonus gap. When calculating the bonus pay gap no allowance is made for this.

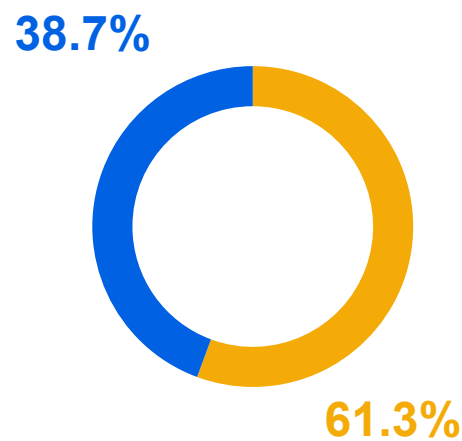

Proportion of workforce receiving a bonus:

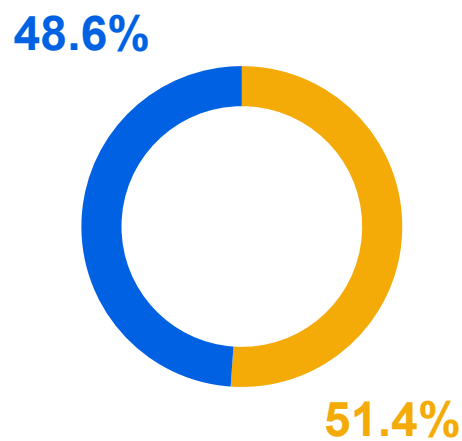


Proportion of males and females by pay quartile. This is the percentage of male and female workforce in four quartile pay bands, (dividing our workforce into four equal parts).

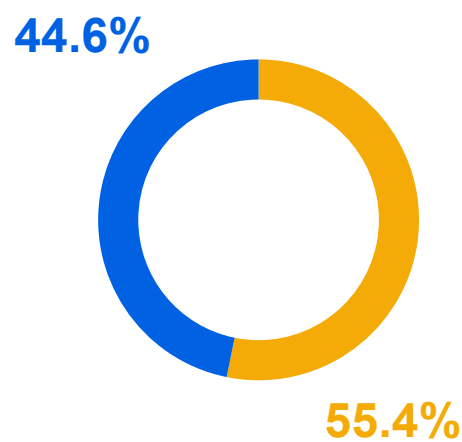
Lower quartile
